Dear friends,

Hallelujah! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Hallelujah!

May I take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Easter season and to thank you all for the lovely warm welcome my sister Susan and I have received since joining the Emmanuel Benefice and our Methodist brothers and sisters.

It's good to remember once more the wonderful, good news that Jesus Christ endured the cross to take upon himself all that we would ever do wrong in our lives. His death means the door to heaven is wide open for all those who love and serve him. His resurrection means that physical death is not the end, we also will rise again.

New Life

I wonder what his death and resurrection mean to you.

It means the world to me. I have to say, that without the knowledge that Christ died for me and rose again triumphant, I would not have a life worth living. I could have filled it with all the good things life could bring: I could have perhaps earned far more money than I did in full time ministry, I could have had every conceivable gadget available on the high street, I could have had a bigger and faster and more street cred car, yet underneath all of that I suspect I would have probably felt empty, lost, alone and unfulfilled.

I chose to follow Christ because he first chose me (and that still knocks me for six). The good news is that he chooses you too! No matter who you are or what you have done God chooses you. It's

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never too late. The price is paid for our shortcomings on the cross. Once we accept that we have a life that no one or nothing can snatch away from us.

Triumph over adversity

It is a life of triumph over adversity.
It is a life of peace through the pain,
it is a life of comfort through loss,
and it is a life of joy we cannot explain.
It is a life purchased through the cross.
I love these wonderful words of St. Paul [The Message Translation]:
Romans 8:31-39

³¹⁻³⁹So, what do you think? With God on our side like this, how can we lose? If God didn't hesitate to put everything on the line for us, embracing our condition and exposing himself to the worst by sending his own Son, is there anything else he wouldn't gladly and freely do for us? And who would dare tangle with God by messing with one of God's chosen? Who would dare even to point a finger? The One who died for us—who was raised to life for us!—is in the presence of God at this very moment sticking up for us. Do you think anyone is going to be able to drive a wedge between us and Christ's love for us? There is no way! Not trouble, not hard times, not hatred, not hunger, not homelessness, not bullying threats, not backstabbing, not even the worst sins listed in Scripture:

They kill us in cold blood because they hate you.

We're sitting ducks; they pick us off one by one.

None of this fazes us because Jesus loves us. I'm absolutely convinced that nothing—nothing living or dead, angelic or demonic, today or tomorrow, high or low, thinkable or unthinkable—absolutely nothing can get between us and God's love because of the way that Jesus our Master has embraced us.

I love that passage because it gives me all the assurance I need when the road seems tough and following Him is a long hard slog. It is worth it!

As spring bursts forth into summer, let us remember that the God who created such beauty and awe-inspiring scenes is the same God who wants to be involved in our lives, who wants to lavish his love upon us. It's up to us whether we let him or not.

I wish you all a very blessed Easter season.

May God's blessing of new life be yours.
May God's gift of peace fill your hearts.
May God's promise of forgiveness give you hope.
May we go forth to tell the good news:
We have seen the risen Lord! Alleluia!

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Dear Friends

A blessed Holy Week and a joyful Easter to you all! The passion, death and resurrection of Jesus transformed and renewed humankind and the whole cosmos. But annually, we need to revisit the story in order to embed our personal stories in Jesus' overarching story.

I have been enjoying reading a book that the Archbishop of Canterbury chose as this year's Lent Book. It is by Selina Stone and entitled "Tarry Awhile - Wisdom from Black spirituality for people of faith". It is about waiting for God, as Jesus did in the Garden of Gethsemane, especially waiting together in vigil services and in tarrying services in the black Pentecostal tradition. She looks at darkness and dualism, movement, belonging and exclusion, life In the Spirit, the place of quiet, healing and weeping. Resurrection is there as an epilogue that completes the tarrying process.

Although these themes seem to fit so powerfully in our Holy Week journey, they are everyday, every month, every year issues. And we cannot wait for God to fix them for us. The presence of his Spirit and the faith, hope and love that do not disappoint us turn us into people of welcome and nurture, people who are Jesus shaped, people who act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with God.

We didn't offer a Lent course this spring. But we have been invited by Leeds diocese to take on a challenge this summer. What is on offer is a chance to join a study course on Carbon Literacy. You can be one of 4 groups piloting a new course that the rest of our Diocese will be experiencing in Creationtide (September 1 - October 4). Carbon Literacy means understanding how global warming and climate change happen and crucially how we, in our homes, work, community and church, can play our part in reversing these trends.

Last year a good number of members of all our churches filled in and returned a questionnaire about Lifestyle and the responses were very helpful to me as Parish Environment Officer. I am hoping that you will join me on this course. Please email me on BerryDeb@icloud.com to show interest. The 5 sessions will be in May, June and early July and could be afternoon or evening. Let me know which you prefer. I will go for the best fit.

Armitage Bridge Ringers

Over the last 12 months we have gathered a group of local ringers together to attempt a peal of "8 Spliced Surprise Major, as this is rung on 8 bells, practice sessions were mainly at The Parish and St. Stephens, Lindley.

Ringing a successful "peal" generally entails ringing 5040 changes, none to be repeated, taking around 3 hours to complete. There is no stopping for breaks and everything has to be committed to memory. As you can imagine a lot of hard work goes into these projects along with setbacks, tears, and frustrations, coupled with excitement and joy when a small amount of progress is made.

Our "band" was made up of 4 Armitage Bridge ringers, Lorraine, Sally, Oliver and Alan, along with Andrea and Alex who have helped teach learners here, with Carole and Peter who rang with us for the recent visit of Bishop Moses.

We had previously suffered failed attempts at St. Chads, Saddleworth, and All Hallows, Almondbury. Our third attempt was planned to coincide with Lorraine's 65th birthday.

Enquiries for a suitable venue was made and we settled on St Bartholemew church in the village of Ripponden. Situated on the River Ryburn a few miles west of Halifax, the church has a ring of 8 bells with a tenor weighing around 9.1/2 cwt (460 kg), start time was arranged for 10:00am. 2hrs and 53 minutes later it was all smiles and celebrations as Oliver called out "That's All". With the bells rung down, the tower locked it was off to the pub to congratulate ourselves on a job well done.
