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#### Almond, Cherry and Raisin Slab Cake

Rub together 6oz Self raising flour

4oz Margarine

Add 6ozs Demerara sugar

2ozs Ground Almonds

1oz Chopped glace cherries

1oz Raisins

Mix together with one egg; to make a stiff dough. Add 1 tablespoon milk approximately. Press into a swiss roll tin.

Bake at 180°C approximately 25-30 minutes, until golden brown.

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### **Armitage Bridge Ringers**

Following our article in the May Focus, more information has been supplied by John Atkinson of the Beverley Handbell Ringers thus: - Archive records indicate that ABHR were formed in 1869 consisting of 11 ringers and conducted by Henry Pogson. They competed in the handbells competition at Belle Vue Gardens at this time. The band also entered in 1870 being conducted at this time by Alfred Shaw.

In 1871 the band won 4<sup>th</sup> prize (14 bands entered), conducted by Seth Coldwell who also conducted in 1872 and 1874 when they won 3<sup>rd</sup> prize in a line-up of 15 bands.

From 1869 to 1871 the secretary of the ABHR was Alexander Lockwood, succeeded by George Boys in 1872. It seems the team disbanded after their success in 1874 as they disappeared from the scene, George Boys apparently conducting for several other bands.

It wasn't until 1913 that the name of ABHR appears on contest lists once more entering the Yorkshire Association of Handbell Ringers, coming a creditable 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 2<sup>nd</sup> section. The conductor was noted as Mr J. Dyson. Running up to the Great War William Henry Wood ran the group

before disbanding until 1986 when a new band was formed under the stewardship of Pauline Murray, we assume this came to an end at the time of the fire as it appears one chest of bells was lost.

The competition pieces played in contests which ABHR took part would indicate that the bell set was significant. A "Long Set" of 5 octaves would certainly have been used and would probably have been about 160 bells in total when purchased from Mears and Stainbank of the Whitechapel Bell Foundry.

#### **Yorkshire Association Inter Branch Striking Competition**

Returning to tower bells, 4 of our ringers were selected to represent the Western Branch of the YACR in the 8-bell striking competition at Gargrave on Saturday May 11<sup>th</sup>, Sally, Lorraine, Oliver and Alan linked up with Carole and Peter Kirby from Lightcliffe plus Andrea and Alex Wain from Huddersfield Parish to ring in this competition against other teams from all over Yorkshire including York, Leeds and Cleveland.

The test piece for all teams was 209 changes of Grandsire Triples which we had been practising at St. Peters for a number of weeks. So it was, that early one bright sunny morning, we wound our way north, picking up members of the team on the way.

Anyone who knows Gargrave will appreciate the first problem is getting parked which, we managed up the road and over the river at the railway station. As we all made our way to St. Andrews church for bacon butties, a cup of tea and the all-important draw at 10:30am by association ringing master Malcolm Turner. We were 2<sup>nd</sup> out of the hat after Cleveland. With the judge in place all was ready to settle some nerves by getting underway.

Listening intently to Cleveland we were sure that if all went well, we could improve on their creditable performance. As they descended from the tower, we offered our congratulations ascending the tower ourselves to ring our piece. 20 minutes is allowed for each team to try ropes for length, ring a practice piece and by signalling to the judge by ringing 2 bells 4 times ring the test piece. Alex conducted the test piece which

takes about 8 minutes to complete. At the end we stood our bells satisfied that we had done as well as we could. We relaxed by the river with a picnic lunch while we listened to the remaining ringing, we would have to wait until the tea and meeting at Kirby Malham to hear the results.



The judge commented on the performance of each team as he heard it. "Team 2 rang with dignity, a well-meant piece of ringing that had long periods with no errors" Total faults 29. That put us a clear 10.1/4 faults in front of the nearest team. We had won! Alex collected the trophy on our behalf from the YACR President Andrew Slade amid whoops of delight and congratulations from the other teams.
