Following Jesus

Lent is a sacred and transformative lesson that invites us to journey with Jesus as he prepares for his ultimate sacrifice and resurrection.

It's a time to deepen our faith, seek forgiveness and grow closer to God.

By embracing the traditions of Lent and making intentional efforts to reflect and renew our spirits we can experience a profound spiritual transformation that will enrich our lives and draw us closer to the heart of God.

I hope what follows will help you achieve that profound spiritual transformation.

Following Jesus does not mean slavishly copying His life. It's more to do with making His choice of life your own, starting from your own potential and in the place where you find yourself.

It's really about living for the values for which Jesus lived and died.

In other words, it's like trying to follow the path he took and trying to see things as He saw them. If there is anything in which this life, this way, can be expressed, in which God has revealed himself most clearly, it is the reality of love.

You are someone only in as far as you are love and only that which has turned to love in your live will be preserved. What love is we can learn from Jesus.

He is the one who has loved most and he will teach us to put the centre of ourselves outside.

"Greater love has no one than this, than they lay down their life for their friends."

Jesus will also teach us to be unlimited space for others, invitation and openness: "Come to me all who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest."

So, we should allow ourselves to be converted to love each day, changing all our energies and potential into selfless gifts for the other person.

In this way we too are changed from within and so through us God's Kingdom will break into the world.

We are called to follow Jesus closely.

Be silent, for it will be true and genuine only if we practise it.

So, let's keep Jesus Christ before our eyes, not hesitating to go anywhere He leads us.

Armitage Bridge Ringers

It seems that since our Christmas celebrations we have done very little at the various towers we are involved with, as Lorraine and I sit here ruminating of what to write it would seem that perhaps we have done more than we at first thought.

We spent Christmas at home with our daughter's family and New Year in Hampshire with our son and his nearest and dearest, after which we were straight back into Wednesday practice night on January 3rd, so not much of a break there then.

The continual bad weather has played havoc with activities up and down the country and ringing has not been any different. Both Saddleworth and Northowram churches have suffered most with some flooding, while our problems have mainly been confined to ropes altering in length and folk physically feeling safe enough to venture out on miserable winter evenings. However, it has meant lots of journeys up and down tower steps to check that all is as it should be both in the ringing and bell chambers.

Notwithstanding we have welcomed back the Halifax Archdeaconry who have a practice at Armitage Bridge on the second Monday in the month. The Friday morning practice at Holmfirth has continued unabated where we help ring and maintain the bells along with the other fixtures and fittings including the very difficult to reach ringing room lights.

At the end of January we were pleased to ring a ¼ peal for our much loved Cath Day who celebrated her 80th birthday. The ringing was preceded by breakfast at "Sons Of The North". 22 ringers, gardeners and friends gathered to wish Cath a very happy birthday.

Our Tuesday practice at Huddersfield Parish has been a little up and down, holidays, work, illness etc has interrupted our progress there, having said that we enjoyed success coming together with some of the Ossett band completing 4 quarter peals including two in tricky methods on 8 bells. We will also be involved in another ¼ peal day on February 17th when we will be ringing on the 6 bells at Armitage Bridge.

In November I took various ropes down to Loughborough for repair at Ellis Ropes with a view to collecting them in February then going on for a tour around Taylors Bell Foundry (which is situated a few miles further on) with a car full of interested parties. Both the snowy weather and illness curtailed that plan, so with a flask of coffee, sandwiches, biscuits and 3 more ropes I set off on my own. As it turned out the day was a wonderful success as the folk at Ellis were very happy to give me some good advice on ropes, then to see the work currently going on at the foundry.

Taylors are the last remaining Bell Foundry in the country, there are other "Bell Hangers" but Taylors are the only ones left who actually cast bells and their fittings.

They are currently having major renovations, been brought out of administration, managing to secure funding the transformation when it is all finished will be astounding. The current owners are preserving a great piece of our industrial national heritage.

So all in all perhaps we have been busier than first thought. Looking forward ; there are ropes to change at Armitage Bridge, Holmfirth and The Parish. At Lindley the bells are to be lifted off the bearings for inspection, cleaning and refurbishment. Four of us have been approached to represent the Western Branch of the Yorkshire Association in the Inter Branch striking competition in May at Gargrave, and for the summer, an overdue excursion with friends into Northern Ireland arranged by Carole Kirby of Lightcliffe is being eagerly anticipated.
